

2017/18 Statewide Tobacco-Use Prevention Education (T.U.P.E.) Annual Report for 23 Cohort M Grants

Tobacco-Use Prevention Education (TUPE) funds support health education efforts aimed at the prevention and reduction of tobacco use. The TUPE program provides funding for programs in grades six through twelve through a competitive application process. Funds are awarded to local educational agencies that propose to replicate evidence-based, effective programs. TUPE grantees must implement instructional, youth development, intervention and cessation activities for students. Grantees may also implement supplemental activities and special events that reinforce the required program.

All local education agencies certified as having a fully implemented tobacco-free school district board policy All local education agencies certified as having a fully implemented tobacco-free school district board policy are eligible to apply for funding. Programs are locally developed, but are expected to align with the Master Plan of the Tobacco Education and Research Oversight Committee and the California Public School Programs Guidance and Requirements for TUPE.

The purpose of the TUPE program is to reduce youth tobacco use by helping young people make healthful tobacco-related decisions. Students receive evidence-based tobacco use prevention instruction and activities that build knowledge as well as social skills. Students take part in youth development strategies that involve youth in advocating for a tobacco-free California and becoming tobacco prevention leaders. Collaboration with community-based tobacco control programs is an integral part of program planning. The school, parents, and the larger community must be involved in the program so that students will be aware of a cohesive effort and concern for their health and, consequently, their ability to succeed in school.

Cohort M Competitive TUPE Grantees, funded from 2017/18, are required to complete an annual online survey, in addition to other reporting requirements. Via the online survey, all 23 grantees provided information about delivering instruction to the general population, youth development, intervention activities, cessation programs, services to targeted populations, staff development, parent training, and community involvement. The aggregated results of the 23 funded grantees are displayed in the tables that follow. The list of the participating grantees is located in Appendix A.

Listed below are highlights of the Annual Report information submitted by the 23 TUPE Grantees:

- The most used research-validated/evidence based prevention programs are Project ALERT (12), and Botvin's Life Skills and Project TND (11). Seven of the eleven programs on the approved list were utilized by at least one grantee. (See Table 1)
- Two grantees implemented 4 research validated/evidence based programs, five grantees implemented 3, ten grantees implemented 2, and six grantees implemented one. (See Appendix B)
- The non-validated prevention program employed to the largest number of students was Teen Health Course Series (47% of students).
- The most popular non-curricula activities or strategies offered were Youth Involvement Antitobacco Advocacy (i.e., Red Ribbon Week, Great American Smoke Out, World No Tobacco Day, Teens Kick Butts/Ash, Youth Quest, Tobacco & Hollywood Campaign, School-Wide Contest, Mission Possible) 74% of all Cohort J students participated. (See Table 3)
- Of the 3,472 students who were involved in intervention programs; 84 percent were involved in *Brief Intervention*. (See Table 4)
- Of the approximately 4,900 students that were involved in cessation programs, most utilized the *California Smokers' Helpline* (90%). (See Table 5)
- Program distributions by grade level are shown in Table 6. Program choices and mix vary widely by grade level.
- Parenting or pregnant minors were identified (1,930) and 99 percent were served. Both a school-based program and a community program served students at sixteen grantee programs. While one provided only school-based services and one provided only community-based services. (See Table 8)
- Overall, 11,323 staff members received some type of TUPE training, 10,349 received general TUPE education, 234 were trained to deliver cessation programs, 577 to deliver intervention strategies, 901 to lead youth development approaches, and 724 to deliver prevention programs. (See Table 9)
- Over 256,000 parents received general TUPE information. (See Table 10)
- Grantees primarily collaborated with local public health agencies (83%) on local tobacco control coalition planning. They also worked with with local non-governmental agencies (87%) and Local Educational Agencies (83%) on youth development activities. (See Table 11)
